The WBU Accounts 2001-02

The results of the WBU for the last two years are shown opposite; together with a forecast of what should happen in the year we have just entered. WBU Financial policy is to aim for a surplus in traditional activities equal to our investment income.

The first thing to say about the accounts is that comparing the individual headings for income against last year is misleading, since income was reduced by 15% when we registered for VAT on 1st April 2001. Members have been more than compensated for this by the inclusion of the profit of Llangollen Swiss teams in general funds. Falling interest rates have adversely affected investment income, which nearly halved, and I have changed our deposit arrangements this year in an attempt to overcome this.

Expenses were more or less as expected, and the surplus in 2001-02 was £587, slightly less than £900 I estimated this time last year. All being well, in 2002-03 we should return to £1500 surplus. For this reason Council is not proposing an increase in subscriptions in 2003-04.

In 2002-03, there are two major events to cause a drain on the World fund, the European teams Championship in Salsomaggiore in June where we are represented by an Open team and a Seniors team, and the European Youth Championships in July in Torquay where Wales will field a team in the Schools section. These two events together with the other claims on the fund are likely to use up all the income, leaving the balance in the fund unchanged. However 2003-4, we hope to have the same income but no major events to fund.

The figures opposite and this commentary have of necessity been summarised, a full copy of the accounts has been sent to every

club. If members have further questions they are welcome to attend the AGM or contact me directly.

Toad in the Hole

It was a beautiful spring evening at Toad Hall, and after an epicurean dinner of lobster bisque, rack of lamb and enough wine, port and cheese to satisfy the gannet who lived at the river-mouth Toad, Moley, Ratty and Badger sat down for a rubber. Badger drew Toad as his partner for the first, a misfortune by his reckoning since Toad was young, reckless and drunker than the rest of the party.

The first deal seemed straightforward enough – Ratty opened 1NT and Moley raised to 3NT. Toad led the six of spades, dummy played small, Badger put in the Jack and Ratty, who was not brave enough to duck, won with the Queen. Able to count only eight top tricks, declarer took the heart finesse and hoped the spades were breaking 4-3 or 6-1. They weren't, but Toad came to his rescue, for when Badger won the ♥K and played the ♠K for partner to overtake, Toad was too befuddled to oblige, and allowed it to hold the trick. 100 below the line to Ratty and Moley, but Badger kept stoically silent, realising that any comment would only upset Toad, who hadn't noticed the contract was defeatable.

On the next hand, Toad showed his usual enthusiasm in the bidding:

Things didn't look good when Ratty started with three rounds of diamonds. Compelled to ruff, Badger was an entry short to cash the ♣J for his eleventh trick. After losing 10p on the first hand, however, he wasn't about to give up. Cashing the ♥A and getting even count from his honest opponents, he placed Ratty with two trumps and Moley with four. He cashed ♣A and K and ♠A and K before returning to hand with a trump. Now on the ♥Q Ratty discarded a spade and so did dummy, leaving this end position:

On the last trump, Ratty was squeezed. A diamond discard would promote dummy's 7; a club would allow Badger to bin dummy's queen and make the last two clubs in his hand. "Well bid, partner", sighed Badger.

A view from the top

The WBU Open Pairs Final was held in early March at the Elephant and Castle, Newtown and the WBU should be congratulated on finding an excellent venue with both a good playing area and ample accommodation.

There were quite a few boards of interest, this being probably the most talked-about. You are fourth in hand at favourable with:

♠ A Q 1 0 9 8 7 6 4 3 2 (... yes, ten of them)!, ♥ 9 6, ♦ void, ♣ Q

LHO opens a weak 2♥, partner bids 2NT (15–18 balanced) and RHO passes. Exhausted from counting all those spades, you now have to decide what to bid. Unfortunately, there are no textbook solutions for these types of hands but I hope you are at least thinking about slams rather than game. After all, partner's 2NT bid should mean that you have at least twelve spades between you.

One possible way of bidding the hand (although requires a little imagination) is as follows: assuming you are playing transfers in this situation, if you bid 3♥, partner will dutifully bid 3♠; follow this up with 4♦ (OK, what else?) and partner will bid 4♥ to show the ♥A. At this point, you could settle for the small slam and jump to 6♠; if you do, you will get 70% of the match points. But if you get delusions of grandeur and bid 5♣ to show a 2nd-round control in clubs (OK, partner may not be on the same wavelength but can hardly pass, so it should be safe) partner will now probably bid 6♣ which must be showing the ace and happy to go on. Now 7♠ might be worth a go, and if you do ...bingo! Partner holds ♠ K 5, ♥ A 8, ♦ Q 9 8 6, ♣ A K J 2

As you can see, 15 tricks in spades are there for the taking but at least half the room never got past 5♠, and +510 was a common result.

The most enjoyable hand for me was this one:

A typical part-score hand where EW can make 2♣ but NS can make 3♥. At my table (I was North), West opened the bidding with 1♣ and East responded 1♠. Now I would not think twice about bidding 2♥ on the South hand in pairs but my partner, Chris Pope, used

extreme caution by passing (he does tend to underbid a little playing with me, usually very sensible but not, unfortunately, on this deal). He heard a 2♠ rebid by West and two passes, back to him. After a little thought, he decided to follow up his original decision by passing again. Undaunted, he led the ♥10 which I took with the ace and switched to my singleton club. Declarer ducked and Chris won with his king.

At pairs, you can quite often afford to take risks when it looks like you are already in for a bad score. Here, Chris knew from the singleton heart in dummy that we had probably missed the boat in hearts and he decided that we probably needed something special in the defence. He decided to try an imaginative switch of the ♦Q!

Declarer, thinking North might have Ax, decided to duck and duck again when Chris continued with the ♦5. In with the 10, I returned another. Declarer was now convinced that Chris was going to over-ruff whatever ♠ he played so decided to discard a club and Chris won with the impossible ace of diamonds and gave me a club ruff. A diamond ruff by Chris, another club ruff for me and with the ♠K still to come gave us +200 and all of the match points.

Yes, we were very lucky but the defence that Chris found made it feel like it was well earned. Even nicer was the fact that Chris earned enough master points that weekend for his promotion to Grand Master. Well-done Chris.

International Round-up

Camrose



The Welsh team of Filip Kurbalija, Tim Rees, Adrian Thomas, Paul Denning, Peter Goodman and Adam Dunn (NPC John Salisbury) was unlucky to lose to a strong England team at the Holt Lodge, Wrexham on 23rd – 24th February, so despite a fine victory over Scotland in the final Camrose weekend in Newport (Kurbalija, Rees, Goodman, Dunn, Jourdain, Ratcliff; NPC Jim Luck) we finished a worthy second in the series.

Commonwealth Nations Bridge Championship (16th–20th July 2002)

For the first time, a **Commonwealth Nations Bridge Championship** will be held in the run up to the Commonwealth Games. The event will take place from Tuesday 16th to Saturday 20th July, 9.30 – 6.30 each day, playing approximately 45 boards a day (with screens, and with short breaks between matches). Spectators are welcome. The playing venue is at Manchester University's Whitworth Hall in the Whitworth Building, Main Campus, Oxford Road, Manchester.



Wales will be represented by Adam Dunn and Peter Goodman, Dafydd and Gary Jones, Filip Kurbalija and Tim Rees, who will join other Commonwealth countries including Australia, Bahamas, Canada, Isle of Man, Sri Lanka, and Tanzania – 30 teams in total.

In addition, we have been able to send a Women's team to the Consolation event on 19th-20th July: Ceri Pierce and Ann Hirst, Liz Atkinson and Margaret Lane, Laura Woodruff and Gilly Clench will join other invited teams to play against those teams that have not qualified for the knock-out stages of the main event.

The Commonwealth Games take place in Manchester from 25th July to 4th August 2002.

European Mixed Championships Ostend

Enthusiastic channel-hoppers, Paul Gagne and Diana Harris, abetted by Annie and Eric Favager, carried the Welsh standard into Europe. Paul reports on their adventures.



We arrived in Ostend and made our way to the venue for registration, and the first thing that struck us was the enormousness of the place. There were some 200 tables set out in this one auditorium, all with screens. For Annie and Eric this was rather mind-blowing compared with the East Wales congress, which they run. However, back to registration: this you have to do via various windows which cover the countries in alphabetical order. We get to the last window and notice that we are the only two pairs under the Welsh banner.

The Italians had rather a large contingent at this event. They had run a country-wide qualification competition, and the top 75 pairs were then flown to Ostend, put up in an hotel, bused to and from the playing area, and flown home. So what were we up against??

We soon found out and the Pairs event passed quickly into oblivion. Both pairs could only sit and admire the way in which the continentals play the game; it was rather like Barry Town FC playing in the Champions' League.

After three days and 160 boards our shell-shocked heroes retreated to their training ground, 30km outside Ostend, to regroup for the teams event. There were not as many teams as we expected - only 92. Now of course we are used to this, you might say, but

the matches were to be of 10 boards and the scoring like that in the Camrose matches, with a maximum 25 VPs out of 30 for a win, but a minimum of 0 out of 30 for the unlucky.

Round 1, and we are drawn against a French team. With spirits high and playing a similar system to them we enter the fray, and lo and behold a win is achieved, 20–10. The nerves are assuaged a little as we await our next opponents.

Round 2, and we are on table 8 out of 92, this is too easy, HA!!!! We are now to play Lavazza, (the eventual winners), an Italian team consisting of several internationals. We return to the table to score up and find we have lost 16-14, a creditable performance.

For the next two rounds of the session we play on and are rather pleased to end the day above average, if only just. However, the bobsleigh run had only just begun.

The next session started at 10am Central European Time, 9 o'clock in the morning Welsh time, and to let Di loose on a pack of cards before 11am is frightening, so our downward spiral picks up speed. There are several bright spots but, after the next six rounds we reach our lowest ebb, and here we meet a Turkish team. We win, and with our ice picks and crampons we climb slowly out of the mire.

Having not qualified after twelve rounds as one of the top 4 teams, we have to play another four matches in the Swiss section. We are not dismayed at this, as our confidence is growing and we can see a light at the end of the tunnel. In the next round we come against a multinational team (mainly Irish but with a Jewish Maltese as its fourth member). It is at this point that I must bring Bridge into this article, as we now encounter the Hand of God.

In the closed room Annie and Eric are playing the Irish pair of Patsy Meehan and John Power, and as can be seen from the hand below the Irish, with help of a psych in clubs by the North hand, reach the dubious contract of 6NT. Now without the lead of a club this contract duly rolls in, 1440 to the bad guys.

In the Open room, where Di and I are playing Maureen (Irish) Dennison and Maurice (Maltese) Leighton we manage to get to the completely unmakeable contract of 6♣, (with no psychs). However now the fun starts. Maurice, on lead, decides he is dummy and leads his ♠QJ874 all at the same time. "Director" the call goes out, and he appears. After much consultation he decides that declarer (Di) should choose the card she wants led, from those exposed, before the real dummy is revealed. After several cards have been played Di decides it is time to attack trumps and plays small to the 10 in dummy. Maltese Maurice ducks in case partner has a stiff ace, Irish Maureen ducks on principle, Di is bewildered. Next comes the other trump from dummy, that's right you guessed it, up goes the ace from Maureen and down comes

the king from Maurice. 6♣ bid and made, 1370 to the good guys and a flattish board. Needless to say the Hand of God works in mysterious ways and we won the match 16-14. The next day Patsy came quietly up to Di and enquired how we made 6♣ as she did not feel it right to ask her team mates.

In the final round we were heartened by an experience which will make us return for more punishment at Championships like these, for even the continentals, no matter how good they are, can make errors. When playing with screens one must alert one's own bids to the person on the same side of the screen, as well as one's partner's.

As the screens were placed, I as North could see only the French lady, and therefore we had to alert to each other. The bidding went as follows (the alerts on each side of the table I will try to indicate).

Thus the final contract became 7♥ doubled, and at this point the Director was called (by the Frenchman), and the bidding sequence

given to him by both sides of the table, indicating the various alerts and non-alerts. He smiled sweetly, shrugged his shoulders in typical French manner, and walked away grinning.

The explanations are as follows:

- ¹ 2♦ correctly alerted by both sides as Multi.
- ² 2♠ alerted by West as a hand with hearts and good values. Not alerted by East, taken as natural.
- ³ 2NT alerted by South as forcing enquiry, alerted by North as good/bad 2NT, forcing 3♣, so that 3♥ could be bid weakly.
- ⁴ 3♦ alerted by South as good Weak Two in spades, North completely flummoxed – why not 3♣? - so taken as natural.

All subsequent bids were taken as natural with East still believing her partner had spades.

At this point, with another win under our belt, we retired gracefully to the bar to wait for another day. Au revoir Ostend - Montreal here we come !!

As an addition, and to thank you for reading this load of drivel, I enclose seven hands for you and your partner to bid. The final contracts are for you to decide (but can you get to them?). Good Luck

Master Point of View

“Busy, busy, busy!” I suppose it’s another sign of age, but I can’t remember if I heard that on TV or found it in one of the books we read to my small granddaughter.

It certainly describes me at the moment. During March there was some build-up in the points I received, but I’ve known it worse. “Perhaps this Year End is going to be fairly quiet,” I said, but when April began the points really flooded in. I soon found the envelopes in our mail catcher behind the front door too many to carry and had to collect them in a plastic shopping bag.

For some months, our morning postal delivery had been getting so late I wondered if it would arrive before afternoon, but some perverse Consignia person has switched it back to early morning in the last month. I frequently find myself woken by the doorbell and must fall out of bed half asleep and stumble down the stairs to sign for someone’s points (Mike, my husband, claims to hear nothing until I am opening the bedroom door in my dressing gown.) If the postman does not want a signature then he wants money for excess postage, and with sleep-dulled brain I must scrounge around to collect such odd sums as 67 pence. Exact money only, by the way, for each time I proffer, say, 70 pence and ask “Have you any change?” the answer is always “No.”

Of course some points are delivered by hand; sometimes just one person’s, sometime a batch. The largest batch arrived in a black refuse sack. A little while later Mike came into my study saying “I tied up that rubbish sack and put it out on the kerb for collection.” Almost at once I knew he was teasing, but I did twitch for an instant.

Of course, checking, adding and entering points takes a considerable time and the Year End work is not finished when all the points are entered, for then I have to prepare the journal listing, promotions and Gold points lists. I’m working hard (oh yes, I am!) but I don’t expect to breathe my sigh of relief until June. So I thought it very unkind the other day when some investment group trying to entice me included with their offer some torn off calendar pages with various phrases about wasting time. “One thing you cannot recycle is time,” said one, so I wasted no time in chucking their letter in the waste paper basket.

As usual with the points I’ve had many notes (“Checked many times, (this) came up more than any other number” I particularly liked), kind messages and cards; some decorated with cats, one with a teddy bears’ wedding scene; “Beautiful,” said my granddaughter. Thank you all. When did teddy bears start to appear in such profusion on all the greetings cards? Surely only in the last few years? Or am I having another forgetful moment? One person who usually writes me a nice letter sent only a brief note. I complained about this when returning her record card and then received a delightful letter with various words replaced by pictures. All to amuse me; or maybe she doubts my reading skills? (Reminds me of the old: “I am writing this slow because I know you can’t read fast.”?)

People often save their points for a long time before sending them in, but this year I received the largest pile of points ever from one person. They spanned quite some years, and some were so old I could not possibly enter them. There were still so many separate entries to make that the computer system broke down. I was horrified. How could this happen to me so near Year End? Fortunately with a bit of fiddling we seemed to get over the problem, but, please, hear my plea “Never let your points pile swell, post them early to Noelle.”

The points slips continue to arrive with odd things among them (very odd sometimes): with notes on the back (Quite intriguing sometimes. Was that an assignation?); in various orders and arrangements, back to front and inside out (well, almost); and various conditions, some good (even fresh from the washing machine), some very bad (bring out the rubber gloves). I expect some Sherlock Holmes could examine some and declare. “These 200 locals belong to a one eyed cat owner with a wooden leg.”

After the Year End is completed, usually I have my day of rest then take time to empty my study of waste paper, file away all the master point slips and tidy up. Fairly soon then I get back to the points, but this year I shall be moving to a new computer system. I expect to spend at least a couple

of weeks getting familiar with it, testing it, and deciding if I want any changes made. So if you post me your points before going on your summer holiday to some exotic location, I'm afraid there may be some delay before you get them back.

In one of my granddaughter's books, a duck who does all the work on a large farm, including looking after the livestock (I said it was a child's story) is constantly being asked "How goes the work?" (as I am) to which it gives an increasingly weary and all encompassing "Quack." Probably in a couple of weeks, I'll be responding with a plaintive "Quaaaack" myself.





Item	Details
Annual subscription	Council is recommending to the AGM that the annual subscription remain the same at £5 for affiliated members and £12 for direct members.
Honoraria	Council has recommended that honoraria to officers be increased for the first time in four years, by 10%.
Area Annual General Meetings	From 2003, Area Associations may hold a green-pointed event in conjunction with their AGMs, the masterpoint scale to be lower than for Area Championships and to be notified after consultation with the Hon. Master Point Secretary.
Graded Masters Pairs	After a major consultation, Council decided that the format of this event should revert to that published in the 1994-1995 (same as 2000-2001) Journal with the following exceptions: players may be permitted to play in a higher section than that for which they are eligible if that Section cannot otherwise be filled; and the Sunday start time will be changed to 12.00..
Welsh Invitation Pairs	This event will replace the International Masters Pairs. Pairs of international standard will be invited from Wales and other countries to play in a Butler-scored pairs with a prize fund sweep. Details to be published in the Journal.
Camrose 2002-2003	Both home matches will be played in North Wales, to simplify travel arrangements for the away teams (Northern Ireland, Republic of Ireland).
